

"Where do you stay?" asked Aki.


"I live a short distance from the mosque," Lapo answered. "Our house is big with a red roof." "We also have many cows and goats and a large banana plantation," Lapo said.


Aki took a long time at the well. His mother became worried. It was getting dark. His mother was not happy because he had delayed at the well. Aki finally appeared but he had no pot.

"Yes, let us attack them more," one player said. "Our defenders must be alert also," the coach said.






The Games teacher greeted the man. "Is this Manzi village?" he asked.


"Do not worry about the language, Aki will soon learn it.
